Welcome

Our strategic plan "Together for squash in Scotland" aims to create a culture where everyone is working together for the good of the game, as the sport continues its recovery from COVID-19. In this annual report, we highlight the areas from across the sport in Scotland where progress has been made and celebrate the outstanding contribution of players, clubs, coaches, referees, volunteers and everyone who supports the delivery of the sport across Scotland.

Huge challenges remain for our sport, with ageing facilities, increased utility costs and more complex regulation and governance required for our volunteers in clubs across the country. As a governing body, Scottish Squash also faces the growing challenge of managing a tight budget in a time of constant price increases and continuing demands.

The organisation has seen a significant change in leadership over the past 12 months, with CEO Maggie Still and Head of Development Alan Mackay moving on after more than 16 years' combined service. Their contribution was pivotal in the realignment of the organisation and the challenges to the sport during the pandemic.

At board level we welcomed a new president Hakim Din replacing Paul Macari who moved to CEO, a new vice-president Marc Hope and three new board members Georgia Adderley, David Myers and Adrian Richmond. New board working groups were introduced in the past year, bringing together volunteers from across the squash community to further promote and develop the sport.

There are many positive for signs for our sport such as an increase in club membership, a growth in licensed coaches and an increase in the number of competitions and entrants. Our regions continue to grow their leagues with an increase in teams playing competitive squash and Racketball has seen a sharp rise in both competition entrants and participation.

Our revised pathway programme continues to evolve to ensure the best possible support for talented players, whilst on the international stage, our performance athletes continue with strong performances when representing Scotland. Scottish Squash is delighted by the work being done to bring more women and girls, and more young people in general, into the sport as players, referees and leaders, breathing life into clubs and regions.

We are so grateful to our lead investor, sportscotland, for their support and guidance and to our partners over the past year Springfield, Dynamik, Dunlop, PDH sport, and Sportshoes. The associated costs are of course a challenge for the sport, and the hard work and support of sponsors, parents and colleagues is greatly appreciated. Once again, so many fantastic achievements, and others, which will mean so much to so many, and for which we should all be extremely proud.

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AThriving Squash Community — —

Aim: To re-energise support for clubs and enable them to provide a sense of belonging for everyone and the opportunity to develop education and training, investment in player-centred coaches, and provision of enjoyable, inclusive competitions.

Squash has a vibrant and diverse club community in Scotland with 86 clubs stretching from Lerwick to Kirkcudbright. Our six regions support them with leagues and competitions.

Moving to Inclusion

Scottish Squash continued to make meaningful progress on its journey within the Moving to Inclusion framework, reaffirming our commitment to ensuring that squash in Scotland reflects the rich diversity of the nation's population. This season has also been marked by inspiring efforts from clubs across the country to engage underrepresented groups within their communities.

Young Ambassadors

Feedback from our first cohort of Young Ambassadors highlighted some key learnings. One of the main challenges was keeping the group connected, as many participants were balancing the demands of squash, school, and other commitments. In response, we have moved towards a more flexible, online model that allows young people to take part without the pressure of frequent travel or conflicting schedules.

Women and Girls

Creating and developing more opportunities for women and girls to experience squash and progress within the sport is a key priority for Scottish Squash. Through support from sportscotland, SLL appointed Ellie Jones in a part-time role as a dedicated Women & Girls development officer who has focused on raising the profile of women's squash, creating a safe and welcoming community, supporting the growth of female coaches, referees and volunteers and relaunching H//T squash for the 2025/2026 season.

WISPS creates a safe, welcoming space for women and girls across Scotland to compete, build friendships, and simply have fun.

Lead by Elaine Inglis, this season gave some truly unforgettable moments that perfectly captured the spirit of WISPS.



Performance Pathway

Aim: More players introduced to, and sustained in squash, inspired through an open, transparent, and easy-to-navigate player pathway. Quality coaching and relevant competition, at club, regional and national levels, enabling players to be the best they wish to be.

Our revised Performance Pathway Programme supports two squads, aims to support young players to develop all areas of their game and to assist the transition from the junior to senior game.

The Under 23 Academy has included the opportunity for players to train alongside the Elite Performance Squad at Oriam, Scotland's Sports Performance Centre, and the Development Squad has featured squad sessions across the different regions in Scotland. A group of eight lead coaches were appointed to support the delivery of these squad sessions, and we would like to thank each of those coaches for their contribution to the programme.





Highlights from the Season

Greg Lobban maintained his position as the highest Scot in the PSA World Ranking finishing the season ranked number 20.

Georgia Adderley achieved a career high PSA World Ranking of 22 as well as beating a top 10 ranked player for the first time.

Lisa Aitken returned from 2 years out with injury and powered back up the rankings, starting the season ranked 459 she finished ranked 54.

Rory Richmond won his first PSA Title this season.

Robyn McAlpine won the Scottish Junior Open U19 girls event and was the highest finishing British player at the World Junior Championships 2025.

Murdo Mackenzie won the Boys U17 Welsh Junior Open.

Sophie Ballentyne won the girls U11 event at the British Junior Championships.


The Scottish Squash Board of Directors remain committed to our corporate governance. As part of our ambition to grow communication and connections throughout the game in Scotland, three new working groups were introduced to further develop Masters squash, Referee development and our Regional Associations. Our new President Hakim Din was elected in March at an EGM which also saw Marc Hope elected as Vice-president, ensuring we now have a full board representing the squash community.

In October last year, our CEO of over 8 years, Maggie Still, left the organisation. Maggie played a pivotal role in transforming the organisation since joining in 2015 during a challenging period for the sport. Scottish Squash extends its deepest gratitude to Maggie for her exceptional leadership and dedication, laying a strong foundation for future growth and success. Our COO Garry McKay moved into an interim CEO position in the Autumn and following an extensive recruitment campaign supported by sportscotland, Paul Macari was appointed CEO in March 2025.

All athletes have the right to compete in sport knowing they and their competitors are clean.


Scottish Squash completed the UKAD compliance requirements this season, and there were no reported cases.



Underlying Performance

The reported deficit for the year was £20k; however, the underlying performance for the year was positive, with an underlying surplus of £7k recorded for the year.

In addition to the non-recurring adjustment for membership income, a loss relating to the Masters representative events was identified, totalling £6k, which is non-recurring. The Masters events are expected to be break-even, but the loss arose due to a portion of income for the FY25 events being taken in FY24.
